- It is also School Board recognition month and members were presented with a Michigan Association of School Board certificate and there is an Armada "spirit wear" shirt on the way for each of them.

Superintendent's Report:

Superintendent Musary shared the following Armada School Updates:

- At Krause elementary, they had their 4th grade Festival of Foods event which was a huge success as students learned a little more about their cultural heritage by creating authentic foods from their native countries. Also, our 1st grade students created a quilt with differences between Thanksgiving and Christmas now versus when their grandparents celebrated these two holidays by interviewing their relatives. Students were asked to show what they learned on a 4 X 4 card that was used to create the quilt.
- The Middle School recently installed a new 3D printer in their STEM lab. Students are now learning the program and logistics to creating items that support STEM and their individual Global Impact Projects.
- The High School had several holiday themed activities including a quartet playing Christmas
 music during lunch periods, culinary students making Christmas cookies, and Mr. Haller's
 chemistry class used chemical reactions to make silver ornaments. Also, this past Sunday,
 Hollywood came to Armada High School to film a few scenes utilizing 30 of our students as
 "extras" for a full-length motion picture called Poor Innocence.
- ACE High School graduated two more students in January bringing our total to 8 for the school year.
- At MA2S, Violet Fiddes' class submitted posters for the National Data Visualization Poster competition. Also, Fighting Pi team members are creating their competition field for a "Destination Deep Space" competition and gearing up for a February 28 – March 2, 2019 District in Gibraltar.
- Our district technology projects this past month included replacing defective projectors in classrooms. Also, we ordered additional laptops and additional science probes for MA2S students.

<u>Curriculum Update</u>: Assistant Superintendent of Instruction and Curriculum, Mr. Phil Jankowski, provided an update of the following:

- The Marshall Plan has now been confirmed at \$1.5 Million. Implementation has begun. Maker Space locations and pre-apprenticeship programs are being decided.
- A Reading Intervention Study was conducted and a Reading Scores by quintile was provided for review.

- The Marshall Plan Roll-out presentation was provided during the Professional Development afternoon of January 11th.
- As part of the school safety update, the staff radios were checked and reprogrammed.
